#### IMPRISONMENT

As to the one-count information, it is adjudged that defendant is committed to the custody of the Bureau of Prisons for a term of 50 months.

I recommend that defendant be given the opportunity to participate in substance abuse education and treatment programs while confined and that he be afforded prerelease placement in a residential reentry center with work release privileges.

Defendant presents neither a flight risk nor a danger to the community. Therefore, execution of the sentence of imprisonment only is stayed until September 15, 2010, when he is to report between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. to an institution to be designated by further court order. Defendant's release on bail and conditions of pretrial services supervision are continued until September 15, 2010.

## SUPERVISED RELEASE

The term of imprisonment is to be followed by a three-year term of supervised release with standard conditions. In light of the serious nature of the crime and defendant's history and characteristics, I am adopting special conditions one through seven as recommended in the supervision plan of the presentence report. Neither party had any objections to the proposed special conditions.

Defendant shall report to the probation office in the district to which defendant is released within 72 hours of release from the custody of the Bureau of Prisons.

Defendant shall not commit another federal, state, or local crime.

Defendant shall not illegally possess a controlled substance.

If defendant has been convicted of a felony, defendant shall not possess a firearm, destructive device, or other dangerous weapon while on supervised release.

Defendant shall cooperate with the collection of DNA by the U.S. Justice Department and/or the U.S. Probation and Pretrial Services Office as required by Public Law 108-405.

If this judgment imposes a fine or a restitution obligation, it shall be a condition of supervised release that defendant pay any such fine or restitution that remains unpaid at the commencement of the term of supervised release in accordance with the Schedule of Payments set forth in the Financial Penalties sheet of this judgment.

Defendant shall comply with the standard conditions that have been adopted by this court (set forth on the next page).

As special conditions, defendant is to:

- 1) Register with local law enforcement agencies and the state attorney general, as directed by the supervising U.S. probation officer;
- 2) Provide the supervising U.S. probation officer any and all requested financial information, including copies of state and federal tax returns;
- 3) Refrain from incurring new credit charges, opening additional lines of credit or opening other financial accounts without the prior approval of the supervising U.S. probation officer;
- 4) Not transfer, give away, sell or otherwise convey any asset worth more than \$200 without the prior approval of the supervising U.S. probation officer;
- 5) Abstain from the use of alcohol and illegal drugs and from association with drug users and sellers and participate in substance abuse treatment. Defendant shall submit to drug testing beginning within 15 days of his release and 60 drug tests annually thereafter. The probation office may utilize the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts' phased collection process;
- 6) Participate in mental health referral, assessment and treatment as approved by the supervising U.S. probation officer and comply with all rules, regulations and recommendations of the mental health agency or its representative to the extent approved by the supervising U.S. probation officer. Defendant shall take any medications prescribed by a licensed medical provider. Defendant shall be required to obtain his own funding for services; and
- 7) Submit his person, property, residence, office or vehicle to a search conducted by a U.S. probation officer at a reasonable time and in a reasonable manner, whenever the probation officer has reasonable suspicion of contraband or of the violation of a condition of release; failure to submit to a search may be a ground for revocation; defendant shall warn any other residents that the premises he is occupying may be subject to searches pursuant to this condition.

#### STANDARD CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISION

- 1) Defendant shall not leave the judicial district without the permission of the court or probation officer;
- 2) Defendant shall report to the probation officer as directed by the court or probation officer and shall submit a truthful and complete written report within the first five days of each month;
- 3) Defendant shall answer truthfully all inquiries by the probation officer and follow the instructions of the probation officer;
- 4) Defendant shall support his or her dependents and meet other family responsibilities;
- 5) Defendant shall work regularly at a lawful occupation unless excused by the probation officer for schooling, training, or other acceptable reasons;
- 6) Defendant shall notify the probation officer at least ten days prior to any change in residence or employment;
- Defendant shall refrain from excessive use of alcohol and shall not purchase, possess, use, distribute or administer any narcotic or other controlled substance, or any paraphernalia related to such substances except as prescribed by a physician;
- 8) Defendant shall not frequent places where controlled substances are illegally sold, used, distributed, or administered;
- 9) Defendant shall not associate with any persons engaged in criminal activity, and shall not associate with any person convicted of a felony unless granted permission to do so by the probation officer;
- 10) Defendant shall permit a probation officer to visit him or her at any time at home or elsewhere and shall permit confiscation of any contraband observed in plain view by the probation officer;
- 11) Defendant shall notify the probation officer within seventy-two hours of being arrested or questioned by a law enforcement officer;
- 12) Defendant shall not enter into any agreement to act as an informer or a special agent of a law enforcement agency without the permission of the court;
- 13) As directed by the probation officer, defendant shall notify third parties of risks that may be occasioned by defendant's criminal record or personal history or characteristics, and shall permit the probation officer to make such notifications and to confirm defendant's compliance with such notification requirement.

## **CRIMINAL MONETARY PENALTIES**

Defendant shall pay the following total financial penalties in accordance with the schedule of payments set forth below.

As to the count of conviction, it is adjudged that defendant is to pay a \$100 criminal assessment penalty to the Clerk of Court for the Western District of Wisconsin immediately following sentencing.

Defendant is to make restitution in the amount of \$201,656.81, to be paid to the Clerk of Court for the Western District of Wisconsin for disbursement to:

No interest is to accrue on the unpaid portion of the restitution obligation.

Under 18 U.S.C. § 3664(f)(3)(B), defendant is to begin making nominal payments of a minimum of \$150 each month within 30 days of his release from custody.

Defendant does not have the means to pay a fine under § 5E1.2(c) without impairing his ability to support himself upon release.

## SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

Payments shall be applied in the following order:

- (1) assessment;(2) restitution;
- (3) fine principal;
- (4) cost of prosecution;
- (5) interest;
- (6) penalties.

The total fine and other monetary penalties shall be due in full immediately unless otherwise stated elsewhere.

Unless the court has expressly ordered otherwise in the special instructions above, if the judgment imposes a period of imprisonment, payment of monetary penalties shall be due during the period of imprisonment. All criminal monetary penalties, except those payments made through the Federal Bureau of Prisons' Inmate Financial Responsibility Program, are made to the clerk of court, unless otherwise directed by the court, the probation officer, or the United States Attorney.

The defendant shall receive credit for all payments previously made toward any criminal monetary penalties imposed.

In the event of a civil settlement between victim and defendant, defendant must provide evidence of such payments or settlement to the Court, U.S. Probation office, and U.S. Attorney's office so that defendant's account can be credited.
