This is a civil action in which plaintiff Michael C. McVeigh is suing defendants UnumProvident Corporation and Provident Life & Accident Insurance Company for denying him disability benefits under the disability policy he purchased from them.

Although neither party disputes diversity, the court has an independent obligation to insure that it exists. See generally Wild v. Subscription Plus, Inc., 292 F.3d 526 (7th Cir. 2002). In this case, plaintiff alleges that he is a citizen of Beavercreek, Ohio. Defendant UnumProvident alleges that it is a Delaware corporation with "one" of its principal places of business in Portland, Maine, without offering an explanation of this contradictory statement. ("Principal" means *most* important, not merely important.) Defendant Provident

Life alleges merely that it is "domiciled" in Tennessee. This is helpful. For diversity

purposes, the citizenship of a corporation is determined by the state in which it is

incorporated or in which it has its principal place of business. See 28 U.S.C. § 1332(c). To

establish that diversity jurisdiction exists, defendant Provident Life must advise the court

both its state of incorporation and its principal place of business.

I will give defendants until August 6, 2002, to provide this court with (1) defendant

UnumProvident's principal place of business and (2) defendant Provident Life's state of

incorporation and its principal place of business.

**ORDER** 

IT IS ORDERED that

Defendants UnumProvident Corporation and Provident Life & Accident Insurance

Company may have until August 6, 2002, to provide this court with (1) UnumProvident

Corporation's principal place of business and (2) Provident Life & Accident Insurance

Company's state of incorporation *and* its principal place of business.
