MEMORANDUM

06-C-280-C

Plaintiff Raymond Bresette is proceeding in this case on a claim that defendants violated his Fourth Amendment rights by unlawfully arresting him on October 10, 2005 and detaining him until October 19, 2005. He is not proceeding in forma pauperis. Nevertheless, he has written to the court to advise that in the course of his transfer from the Dodge Correctional Institution to Redgranite Correctional Institution, his papers pertaining to this case have been lost. He notes also that he has been separated from someone who has been helping him with his case. He asks that the court to send him a copy of all the documents in the court's file and "guidelines and statutes" he might need in order to file motions for an enlargement of time or motion to proceed in forma pauperis.

It is this court's practice to charge non-indigent litigants \$.50 a page for photocopies and indigent litigants \$.10 a page. Although plaintiff paid the \$350 fee for filing his complaint, I will assume from his circumstances that he qualifies for photocopies at the indigent rate. Therefore, I am enclosing to him with a copy of this order the operative complaint (Dkt. #7), this court's screening order (Dkt. #3) and order allowing plaintiff to proceed on his amended complaint (Dkt. #11), defendants' answer to the amended complaint (Dkt. #10) and the magistrate judge's preliminary pretrial conference order. These documents total 35 pages. Plaintiff is to submit a check or money order made payable to the clerk of court in the amount of \$3.50 to cover the cost of copying the documents.

As for plaintiff's request for "guidelines and statutes," many of the procedures plaintiff is expected to follow are described in or attached to the magistrate judge's preliminary pretrial conference order. Otherwise, this court requires litigants to follow the federal rules of civil procedure, which may be found in the prison's law library.
